Got It! Parent information sessions

Getting on Track in Time – Got It! is an early intervention program provided by a specialist mental health team in partnership with NSW Education. The NSLHD Got It! Team will be implementing the program in all NSW Primary Schools across Northern Sydney. In 2019, parent information sessions were well received, and these will be offered again in 2020.

Children will display difficult behaviours as a normal part of development because they do not yet have the social, emotion and problem solving skills to manage new challenges. The *Got It!* program is designed to assist with emotional and social wellbeing and addressing disruptive behaviours, both at school and home.

The program aims to intervene early and assist children to enhance their emotional and social skills and assist in improving and preventing the development of disruptive behaviours. When disruptive behaviours occur regularly they can negatively influence children's academic, emotional and social development. Working with parents/carers and teachers to develop a consistent approach at home and school will help to create positive and sustainable change.

If you missed out last year or are new to our school this year, I would encourage all parents to come along on 17th and 24th March for these informative sessions.

Last Friday, 28th February, we had the great honour of inducting our K-6 Student Representative Council (SRC) members into their leadership roles for 2020. These students will advocate as student voice in a number of areas this year, and myself, the executive team, the teachers and administration teams at Galston PS look forward to working with them. 

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Portable Digital Device Procedures and Guidelines

Portable digital devices include but are not limited to:

- Mobile phones
- Smartwatches
- iPods/iPads
- Mp3 players
- Personal media devices including gaming devices
- Digital cameras
- Netbooks and laptops

Galston Public School is lucky enough to have iPad devices and laptops used throughout the school to enhance learning, wellbeing and educational attainment.

As a result, the following applies:

- Galston Public School recommends that students do not bring any of the above personal devices to school.
- The only exception is for students who need to carry a mobile phone due to travel arrangements or other accepted safety reasons.
- Parents with an urgent need to contact their child during the day should contact the school
 office and appropriate steps will be taken to pass on the message.
- 4. Galston Public School will take no responsibility for damage, loss or theft of any personal devices.

Students who bring mobile phones to school must adhere to the following procedure:

- Phones will be labelled with the child's name, switched on to silent and handed in at the office upon arrival at school before 8:55am.
- Phones will be collected after school finishes at 3:00pm from the office.
- Phones will be stored securely for the duration of the day.



CAUGHT ON CAMERA! PENALTIES NOW APPLY

Drivers caught on camera illegally using their mobile phone will be issued fines and demerit points from today.

The NSW Government's world-first mobile phone detection cameras have been operating in warning mode since 1 December 2019, but drivers caught doing the wrong thing will now cop a \$344 fine and five demerit points.

Minister for Roads Andrew Constance said 9 million vehicles had been checked by the cameras during the three-month warning period, with more than 30,000 warning letters issued to offending drivers.

"We're seeing more than 99 per cent of drivers doing the right thing, so when we compare this with the findings from the pilot last year, it is clear drivers are starting to get the message.

"As fines and demerits start to be issued from today we expect the number of offences could fall even further, making NSW roads safer for everyone.

"It's important that drivers who continue to put the safety of themselves, passengers and the local community at risk realise that no matter where you are you could be caught and you will be fined," Mr Constance said.

Minister for Regional Roads Paul Toole said taking your eyes off the road for longer than two seconds doubled the risk of a crash.

"The decision to pick up your phone can have fatal consequences. Whether you're driving on a major highway or an isolated road in the bush, there's no excuse for using your phone illegally," Mr Toole said.

"The cameras are both fixed and transportable, with the trailer-mounted cameras to be frequently moved around the state, targeting illegal mobile phone use anywhere, anytime."

NSW Police continue to enforce illegal mobile phone use and issue infringements as part of regular operations.
